


The Rowen Region: Georgia's Nexus for Economic Growth

For all these trailblazers, Rowen is a hub of possibility — a place where talent meets opportunity, where groundbreaking ideas take shape, and where the future is built. The numbers speak for themselves:



- **43%** of Georgia's population growth will come from our 11-county region.
- More than **24,000** people move here each year.
- Our high school graduation rate stands at 90%, with recent years averaging over 50,000 college graduates – top degrees are in business, computer science, healthcare and engineering.
- We are surrounded by colleges and technical schools and have board level partnerships with **four** of America's top-ranked institutions of higher educations.
- More than **100,000** residents with higher education experience are not yet in the labor force—an untapped well of potential.




The labor force in the 11-county Rowen Region is strong, with significant diversity in **educational attainment**, **race**, **industry**, **and income**.

The Rowen Region outpaces the state average for bachelor's degree and graduate degree population, with nearly 70% of the regional population having some educational training beyond high school.

EDUCATIONAL ATTAINMENT, POPULATION AGE 25+



EDUCATIONAL ATTAINMENT AND RACE



25-64 POPULATION

Nearly half (46%) of the growth in prime working age population is expected in the Rowen Region during the next five years.

The Rowen Region has experienced significant movement over the past decade, with an average annual net migration of **24k** people, even after accounting for the COVID years of 2020 and 2021 when movement was limited.






INDIVIDUALS MOVING TO THE ROWEN REGION BY AGE 2010-2019


PROGRESSION OF WORKFORCE DIVERSITY 2030-2050




The workforce within the Rowen Region is unparalleled across Georgia especially in areas such as growth, diversity, and qualified talent.

GROWTH The Rowen Region has witnessed substantial in-migration, with a net increase of 305,000 people since 2010. This trend is expected to continue.

Over the past 12 years, the Rowen Region has seen an average of almost 24,000 individuals moving in each year.

Nearly half of the growth in the state's prime working age (25-64 year olds) between 2023 and 2028 is expected in the Rowen Region.



COMPLETIONS BY ACADEMIC YEAR IN THE REGION



DIVERSITY The Rowen Region has a diverse workforce and talent pipeline.


Educational institutions in the Rowen Region train a diverse student population; over 50% of all degrees are completed by students of color.


EDUCATIONAL ATTAINMENT BY RACE: BACHELOR'S DEGREES AND ABOVE


QUALIFIED TALENT Not only is the talent within the region growing and diversifying, it is also highly qualified.

The Rowen Region outpaces the state average graduation rate by nearly 6% with a graduation rate hovering around 90%, compared to 84.4% statewide.







HIGH SCHOOL GRADUATION RATES The Rowen Region has stellar high school graduation rates with an average around 90%, while the statewide graduation rate is 84.4%. Strong graduation rates also persist across racial groups in this region.




HIGH SCHOOL GRADUATES Over the past decade the Rowen Region high school graduate cohorts have increased in size from nearly 27,000 to nearly 36,000, a **33.6%** increase compared to only **27.1%** across the state.


NUMBER OF HIGH SCHOOL GRADUATES




DEGREE COMPLETIONS Degree completions are on the rise at institutions. Bachelor's degrees continue to be the most earned degree.

COMPLETIONS BY ACADEMIC YEAR IN THE REGION






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
GRADUATE DIVERSITY Degree earners in Rowen Region institutions have become more diverse in the past five years. Asian and Hispanic students have seen the largest growth.
